FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDING MINISTER

Dear Members and Friends:

Each year, The Church for The Fellowship of All Peoples celebrates its anniversary by convening the Howard Thurman Convocation. It is a special time for us to remember those visionary and courageous individuals who made real the idea of an inclusive religious organism dedicated to the search for common ground among all the peoples of the world.

The church was born in a time of great external and internal crisis, symbolized by World War II and the systemic racial divide. In October 1944, the church came into being, a year before the creation of the United Nations.

Dr. Howard Thurman, co-founding minister, narrates the beginning of our church in the wonderful book, *Footprints of a Dream*. In it he states the following:

"The movement of the Spirit of God in the hearts of men often calls them to act against the spirit of their times or causes them to anticipate the spirit which is yet in the making. In a moment of dedication, they are given wisdom and courage to dare a deed that challenges and to kindle a hope that inspires."

While commemorating our legacy, the convocation also calls us forward to address the challenges of our day, this day. It demands that we re-commit our resources – personal, institutional, systemic – to promote with renewed vigor our commitment to transforming the barriers that undercut our common humanity and, therefore, divinity.

We are honored to have as our speaker for this year's convocation, our 13th, Chaplain James Yee. While serving as chaplain at Guantánamo Bay, Cuba, Chaplain Yee objected to the cruel and degrading abuses to which Muslim "detainees" were subjected. For his honesty and integrity he was arrested and imprisoned for seventy-six days, being falsely accused of spying, espionage, and aiding the alleged Taliban and Al-Qaeda prisoners.

How does one keep hope and faith alive under such circumstances? What "tools of the spirit" attended his sojourn, giving a hint of triumph? Chaplain Yee will share his journey in his keynote address: "Faith in a Time of Crisis."

Chaplain Yee will also receive the Howard Thurman Award. The award is given annually to an individual or persons, embodying the life and legacy of Dr. Thurman, search for common ground.

We are also blessed to have music provided by two extraordinary musicians, Dr. Carl Blake and Mr. Julian Levant.

Become a part of the "movement of the ennobling Spirit" by joining us each Sunday morning as we re-kindle our dedication to embodying a more compassionate world.

BIOGRAPHIES

CHAPLAIN JAMES J. YEE - Captain Yee is a former US Army Chaplain and graduate of West Point who served as the Muslim Chaplain for the U.S. prison camp in Guantánamo Bay, Cuba that became controversial for its treatment of detainees designated as "enemy combatants" by the U.S. government. While ministering to prisoners at Guantánamo Bay, Captain Yee objected to the cruel and degrading abuses to which the prisoners were subjected. This outspokenness led to his arrest and imprisonment, while being falsely accused of spying and espionage. After months of government investigation, all criminal charges were dropped. With his record wiped clean, Chaplain Yee resigned from the U.S. Army receiving an Honorable Discharge and was later awarded a second Army Commendation Medal for "exceptionally meritorious service."

Chaplain Yee's gripping account of his Guantánamo experience and struggle for justice has been recently published and is entitled For God And Country: Faith and Patriotism Under Fire. The Washington Post called it "required reading for all U.S. officials waging war on Islamic terrorists."

DR. CARL LeROY BLAKE, pianist – Carl Blake holds three degrees in piano performance: the Bachelor of Music (*magna cum laude*) from Boston University, the Master of Arts from San Jose State University, and the Doctor of Musical Arts from Cornell University. He is the first recipient of the Marian Anderson Young Artist Award (presented by Ms. Anderson herself) that led to a year of private study with Pierre Sancan of the Paris Conservatory of Music.

Dr. Blake is a concert artist who has received international critical acclaim. He has performed three times in Carnegie Recital Hall, once in Wigmore Hall in London and has traveled as an Artistic Ambassador for the U.S. Department of State to countries in the Caribbean Islands, Central and South America and Mexico.

Blake is the recipient of two Fulbright Scholar Awards to teach and perform in Honduras, Central America. Currently he is piano instructor at Oakland School for the Arts.

JULIAN LEVANT, tenor – Julian Levant is one of the Bay Area's most beloved musicians. He has received international acclaim for his magnificent voice and artistry. An environmental health systems analyst, Mr. Levant holds a Master of Music Degree, San Francisco Conservatory and Master of Business Administration Degree, Ashford University.

Once to every soul and nation comes the moment to decide, in the strife of truth with falsehood, for the good or evil side: then to stand with truth is noble, when we share its wretched crust; ere that cause bring fame and profit, and 'tis prosperous to be just.

LIFE'S WORKING PAPER

For every man there is a necessity to establish as securely as possible the line along which he proposes to live his life. In developing his life's working paper, he must take into account many factors, in his reaction to which he may seem to throw them out of line with their true significance. As a man, he did not happen. He was born, he has a name, he has forebears, he is the product of a particular culture, he has a mother tongue, he belongs to a nation, and he is born into some kind of faith. In addition to all of these, he exists, in some curious way, as a person independent of all other facts. There is an intensely private world, all his own; it is intimate, exclusive, sealed.

The life working paper of the individual is made up of a creative synthesis of what the man is in all his parts and how he reacts to the living processes. It is wide of the mark to say that a man's working paper is ever wrong; it may not be fruitful, it may be negative, but it is never wrong. For such a judgment would imply that the synthesis is guaranteed to be a certain kind, of a specific character, resulting in a foreordained end. It can never be determined just what a man will fashion.

Two men may be born of the same parents, grow up in the same environment, be steeped in the same culture, and inspired by the same faith. Close or even cursory observation may reveal that each has fashioned a life working paper so unique that different roads are taken, and each day the two men grow farther apart. Or it may be that they move along precisely parallel lines that never meet.

Always, then, there is the miracle of the working paper. Whenever there appears in human history a personality whose story is available and whose reach extends far in all directions, the question of his working paper is as critical as is the significance of his life. We want to know what were the lines along which he decided to live his life. How did he relate himself to the central issues of his time? What were the questions which he had to answer? Was he under some necessity to give a universal character to his most private experience?



James Yee, Former US Army Muslim Chaplain at Guantánamo Bay, with Aimee Molloy



What do you believe in?

James Yee believed in God and America and one of those got him thrown in jail.

In 2001, Captain James "Yusuf" Yee was commissioned as one of the first Muslim chaplains in the United States Army. After the tragic attacks of September 11, 2001, he became a frequent government spokesman, helping to educate soldiers about Islam and build understanding throughout the military. Subsequently, Chaplain Yee was selected to serve as the Muslim Chaplain at Guantánamo Bay, where nearly 700 detainees captured in the war on terror were being held as "unlawful combatants."

In September 2003, after serving at Guantánamo for ten months in a role that gave him unrestricted access to the detainees--and after receiving numerous awards for his service there--Chaplain Yee was secretly arrested on his way to meet his wife and daughter for a routine two-week leave. He was locked away in a navy prison, subject to much of the same treatment that had been imposed on the Guantánamo detainees. Wrongfully accused of spying, and aiding the Taliban and Al Qaeda, Yee spent 76 excruciating days in solitary confinement and was threatened with the death penalty.

After the U.S. government determined it had made a grave mistake in its original allegations, it vindictively charged him with adultery and computer pornography. In the end all criminal charges were dropped and Chaplain Yee's record wiped clean. But his reputation was tarnished, and what has been a promising military career was left in ruins.

Depicting a journey of faith and service, Chaplain Yee's *For God and Country* is the story of a pioneering officer in the U.S. Army, who became a victim of the post-September 11 paranoia that gripped a starkly fearful nation. And it poses a fundamental question: If our country cannot be loyal to even the most patriotic Americans, can it remain loyal to itself?

James Yee, a third-generation Chinese-American and a 1990 graduate of West Point, served in the U.S. Army for 14 years, including a tour in Saudi Arabia during the aftermath of the first Gulf War. His spiritual conversion to Islam in 1991 guided his travels to Damascus, Syria, where he studied for four years. He twice traveled to Mecca to make the Haj, the sacred Muslim pilgrimage
