Dear Members and Friends:

Welcome to the Sixth Annual Howard Thurman Convocation. This year's theme, The Death Penalty: A Critical Question for Our Time, is certainly a challenging and provocative one. We are gathered here today to reflect more deeply and intentionally upon this spiritual issue. Capital punishment compels us to think about the meaning of life and death, the purpose of existence, and the quality of our communal living. Each Sunday at Fellowship Church we recite: "I affirm my need for a growing understanding of all peoples as children of God." The death penalty raises the profoundly ethical question of our individual as well as corporate relationship to those children of God executed in our names. It should be noted that the United States is the only western democratic country still carrying out executions.

The convocation is held in honor of Dr. Howard Thurman, co-founding pastor. Dr. Thurman was selected by Life magazine in 1953 as one of the twelve most influential clergy in the United States. Dr. Lerone Bennett of Ebony magazine and many others consider him a Twentieth Century holy man. His life was devoted to the search for common ground and the embodiment of the oneness of life despite socially imposed barriers that appeared to undercut that unity. Dr. Thurman believed we have responsibility for putting at the disposal of our sisters and brothers resources that nurture their potential as revelations of the Creator of Life. He would embrace restorative rather than retributive measures for that who have committed offenses.

Actor/Activist Danny Glover, Actress Rhodessa Jones and Congresswoman Barbara Lee are this year's recipients of the Howard Thurman Award. Their lives exemplify commitment to these high ideals. The fact that Mr. Glover and Ms. Jones are donating their services today is indicative of their consistent sacrificing for the sake of a better world. Several other participants are also donating their services today. Due to responsibilities in Washington, Congresswoman Barbara Lee is unable to attend today and will receive her award, November 18 (Dr. Thurman's birthday), during the 11:00 am worship service.

It is my prayer that you will be richly rewarded and ennobled through your attendance today. Your presence is a great blessing to me.

Danny Glover: recipient of the Howard Thurman Award

A native of San Francisco, Danny Glover attended San Francisco State University and trained at the Black Actor's Workshop of the American Conservatory. He appeared in numerous stage productions, including the *Island* and *MacBeth* at the Los Angeles Actors' Theater and *Sizwe Banzi is Dead* at the Eureka Theatre. However, it was Glover's performance in the New York production of Athol Fugard's *Master Harold and the Boys*, that brought the actor national recognition.

His film credits include: Places in the Heart, Witness, Silverado, The Color Purple, The Lethal Weapon series, Bat-21, Grand Canyon, To Sleep with Anger, Angels in the Outfield, The Saint of Fort Washington, Beloved, and Boseman and Lena. He received an NAACP Image Award as well as an ACE Award for his performance in HBO's production of Mandela. Glover received Emmy nominations for Best Supporting Actor for his roles in the television series Lonesome Dove, and for Turner Network Television's Freedom Song.

In 1990, Glover starred in Charles Burnett's award-winning and critically acclaimed, To Sleep with Anger, playing a character whose ambivalent conflict between his good and dark sides brings three generations of a contemporary Black family to dangerous crossroads. To Sleep with Anger marked Glover's debut as an executive producer. Other films executive produced by Glover include: HBO's America's Dream series for Black History Month; the HBO-BBC movie Deadly Voyage, based on a true story of eight African stowaways who were slaughtered on the high seas by a Ukrainian freighter crew; TNT's Buffalo Soldier, a dramatic story of America's first all-Black cavalry unit; and TNT's Freedom Song, a story about the civil rights movement for which he received an Emmy Award nomination for best supporting actor.

Glover hosted and executive produced Courage, a one-hour, weekly primetime series for Fox Family Channel celebrating and profiling real people who have shown courage and bravery in moments of crisis. Courage was selected by TV Guide as one of the Top Ten Inspirational Shows on Television for 2000.

In response to the AIDS crisis in Africa, and in order to raise awareness about the impact of the disease on underserved communities in the United States, Glover has extended his tenure as Goodwill Ambassador for the United Nations Development Program. He is also a major supporter of the TransAfrica Forum, the African-American lobbying organization on Africa and the Caribbean, and the Algebra Project, a math empowerment program developed by civil rights veteran Bob Moses.

Rhodessa Jones: recipient of the Howard Thurman Award

Rhodessa Jones is Co-Artistic Director of the San Francisco performance company Cultural Odyssey, and is also an actress, dancer, teacher, singer and writer. Ms. Jones recently starred in the award winning hit play, The Vagina Monologues produced by Theater on the Square. Her 2001 film collaboration We Just Be Telling Stories won "Best Documentary" at the San Francisco Black Film Festival. The film profiles Ms. Jones and her work with the Medea Project Theater for Incarcerated Women in the San Francisco County jails. She is Director and founder of the project, which is a performance workshop designed to achieve personal and social transformation with incarcerated women. Ms. Jones offers a new model for rehabilitation which has developed into an arts education and recovery curriculum utilizing performance. She demonstrates this model in collaboration with the San Francisco Sheriff's Department, the Ofice of the District Attorney, and community rehabilitation centers.

Rhodessa Jones was awarded a Bay Area Critics Special Award for her work with The Medea Project. She has been awarded the San Francisco Foundation Community Leadership Award, the Working Woman of the Year award by the Working Women's Theater Festival, the AUDELCO Board of Director's Award, the 1999 Sister Circle Book Award. The Black Theatre Network presented Ms. Jones with the President's Pathfinder Award. Ms. Jones' Big Butt Girls, Hard Headed Women won a "Bessie" the New York Dance and Performance Award. Her collaboration with Bill T. Jones and Idris Ackamoor, Perfect Courage received the Dance Bay Area's 1991 "Izzie" Award for Outstanding Achievement in Performance.

Ms. Jones has been a featured teacher at LaMama Umbria, an international theater taining workshop in Italy hosted by LaMama ETC of New York. She has taught as Visiting Professor at the University of California at Berkeley, as Resident Instructor at New World Theater in Amherst, Massachusetts and as a resident at the Getty Research Institute, and as an Artistic Resident at Yale School of Drama. In 1995 Ms. Jones and Idris Ackamoor taught and created performance workshops for children from Italy, South Africa, the United States and Spain in an international youth festival.

Born in Florida to a migrant laborer family, Rhodessa Jones is a proud grandmother of her daughter's girl child Chaz.

Dr. Howard Thurman

At the time of his death in 1981, Howard Thurman was Dean Emeritus of Marsh chapel, Boston University, and Chairman of the Board of the Howard Thurman Educational Trust in San Francisco. He also served as Dean of Rankin Chapel, Howard University, Washington, D.C.; as professor at Howard University School of Religion, and as Director of Religious Life at Morehouse and Spelman Colleges, Atlanta. He was Honorary Canon of the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine, New York City. Together with Dr. Alfred Fisk, Dr. Thurman was a founding pastor of the Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples in San Francisco, the first interracial, interfaith church in the United States

Lerone Bennett, Jr. of *Ebony Magazine* described Dr. Howard Thurman as "one of the greatest spiritual resources of the nation. For more than fifty years he leaped across mountain peaks of spirituality offering bridges to men and women who want to walk with ease across the doctrinal and racial chasms that divide us." In 1953 Life Magazine named Dr. Thurman one of the outstanding clerics in the United States.

In 1936 Dr. Thurman and his spouse, Sue Bailey Thurman, became the first Black Americans to be received by Mahatma Gandhi. During their discussion about systematic racial oppression, Gandhi predicted it could be through the African American that nonviolence would exert its greatest global impact. This prediction found fulfillment in the unique and prophetic leadership of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who always carried a copy of Dr. Thurman's powerful book, Jesus and The Disinherited.

Poet, Mystic, Philosopher and Theologian, Dr. Thurman authored more than twenty books including: Meditations of the Heart, The Inward Journey, Jesus and the Disinherited, The Centering Moment, The Creative Encounter, The Search for Common Ground and With Head and Heart, his autobiography.

Many of Dr. Thurman's books are available at The Church for The Fellowship of All People.

Carl Blake is a pianist who has performed throughout the United States, Europe, Russia, the Caribbean, and Latin America.

Robert Bryan is a noted attorney who has worked on several death row cases.

Noah Griffin is a member of Fellowship Church and is active as a musician and writer.

Kathryn Joelli is administrative assistant at Fellowship Church and works with the Even Start family literacy project.

Felix Justice is a member of Fellowship Church with a career in drama and film.

Johnny Land is music director at Fellowship Church; he has performed, taught and produced musical productions. This spring he will be producing *In Search of a Legend*, a musical he has written about Josephine Baker.

Perry Lang is assistant minister at Fellowship Church. He recently co-produced the CD *Triumph of the Spirit* with spoken word and music responding to the experience of slavery.

Gwen Mazur is a member of the Board at Fellowship Church and has her own company, Total Image Interior Design.

Glen Nance is Chairperson of the Board at Fellowship Church. He is a professor at San Francisco City College.

Gayle Orr-Smith is a member of the Board at Fellowship Church and is president of Heiress Public Relations.

Artists from Death Row

Kevin Cooper is an artist and inmate on death row at San Quentin Prison, convicted of murdering the Ryen family and a houseguest in San Bernadino county in 1985. Kevin came within five days of execution in 1995 before an appeal was filed. Consider the following facts:

Josh Ryen, the sole survivor of the 1985 attack has always maintained that three white people killed his family; Josh and his grandmother support Kevin Cooper's defense team.

clumps of long, blond hair were found in the hands of victims. Kevin

Cooper is African-American.

The police department threw away evidence that might implicate someone other than Kevin Cooper. A pair of bloody coveralls was submitted to the police by a woman claiming that her boyfriend, whom she believed was involved in the murders, had left them at her house. The police disposed of the coveralls in a dumpster, according to records.

 More than one weapon was used in the brutal murders, indicating multiple killers. Prosecutors did not account for this, claiming that

Kevin Cooper acted alone.

A bloody shoeprint on a bed sheet from the murder scene, the brand of which matched a pair of shoes that Kevin Cooper owned, was only discovered after Kevin Cooper was in custody. The shoeprint was not found at the scene but in the crime lab.

Hostile, racist demonstrations were held near the courthouse after

Kevin Cooper was taken into custody.

Kevin Cooper is appealing his case based on the racism, destruction of evidence, lack of DNA testing and inadequate defense counsel. For more information call (510) 835-0558.

"The Perpetrator Series" Sculpture by Lorraine Bonner

I have been working in clay for about ten years, mostly independently in my home. In the beginning it was a way of exploring certain intense personal themes, but the exploration has taken me in both an inward and outward direction. The focal point is the concept of perpetration: the act which betrays the trust on which all mutually interdependent life on earth depends.

Some people say we are all perpetrators, simply by participating in the food chain, or by being a part of the system that is raping the planet. Does this mean there is no difference between the mother who takes her children to eat at a McDonalds and the father who molests those children?

How can our government, which supports repressive regimes all over the world, has the world's highest prison population and no rational health care system, call itself a beacon of freedom and democracy? How can so much killing be done in the name of religions whose primary teaching is love?

People are being traumatized next door and across the planet, but the perpetrators are so skilled in denial that it is often hard to see them. When perpetration is denied, we end up thinking our suffering is something we are doing to ourselves. When people are reluctant to use the term "victim," are they participating in the denial of perpetration?

How can we wake up from the trance which enables us to "not notice" these contradictions?

I have only lately come to art as a way of exploring these questions. I have spent most of my life as a scientist, and have been a physician for over twenty years. During much of my medical career I used meditation and guided imagery with patients to discover the roots of their pain and illness. In this work as in my own personal work I began to recognize parallels to the larger world. I have come to realize that the true illness of the human race needs something other than medicine or surgery. I am looking for that something now.

Restorative Justice

Instead of thinking about retribution, we might consider the lessons and experiences of South Africa. In South Africa the apartheid regime tortured and murdered many. When apartheid was overthrown, the country decided not to simply grant a blanket amnesty, nor to hold something like the Nuremberg Trials. Instead, they sponsored the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, which required an honest account of the atrocities as a condition for amnesty. Desmond Tutu, retired Archbishop of Cape Town, describes this different effort at "restorative justice" in his book *No Future Without Forgiveness*:

Let us conclude this chapter by pointing out that ultimately this third way of amnesty was consistent with a central feature of the African Weltsanschauung—what we know in our languages as ubuntu, in the Nguni group of languages, or botho in the Sotho languages. What is it that constrained so many to choose to forgive rather than to demand retribution, to be so magnanimous and ready to forgive rather than wreak revenge?

Ubuntu is very difficult to render into a Western language. It speaks of the very essence of being human. When we want to give high praise to someone we say, "Yu, u nobuntu"; "Hey, so-and-so has ubuntu." Then you are generous, you are hospitable, you are friendly and caring and compassionate. You share what you have. It is to say, "My humanity is caught up, is inextricably bound up, in yours." We belong in a bundle of life. We say, "A person is a person through other persons." It is not, "I think therefore I am." It says rather: "I am human because I belong. I participate, I share." A person with ubuntu is open and available to others, affirming of others, does not feel threatened that others are able and good, for he or she has a proper self-assurance that comes from knowing that he or she belongs in a greater whole and is diminished when others are humiliated or diminished, when others are tortured or oppressed, or treated as if they were less than who they are.

Harmony, friendliness, community are great goods. Social harmony is for us the summum bonum—the greatest good. Anything that subverts, that undermines this sought-after good, is to be avoided like the plague. Anger, resentment, lust for revenge, even success through aggressive competitiveness, are corrosive of this good. To forgive is not just to be altruistic. It is the best form of self-interest. What dehumanizes you inexorably dehumanizes me. It gives people resilience, enabling them to survive and emerge still human despite all efforts to dehumanize them.


